

FairWay Resolution Anne Scragg Scholarship Terms and Conditions

Introduction

Anne Scragg retired from FairWay in 2015 after a distinguished career. Her career stands out because of the breadth of experience she gained, the scale of dispute resolution work she led, and her unique blend of leadership, professionalism as a practitioner, and constant and unwavering commitment to innovation and excellence.

Purpose of the Scholarship

The FairWay Resolution Anne Scragg Scholarship was established by FairWay Resolution Limited (FairWay) in 2015 to celebrate Anne Scragg's career in dispute resolution, and to ensure her unwavering commitment to innovation and excellence continues as her legacy to FairWay and to the dispute resolution profession.

The purpose of the Scholarship is to encourage people to pursue a rewarding career in dispute resolution, and to base their career on sound academic study, practice and ongoing professional development. The Scholarship also aims to support the profession by encouraging a focus on a greater access to justice for New Zealanders, greater quality of dispute resolution, and encouraging new ideas that ensure the profession remains responsive to New Zealand's changing society and economy.

Eligibility

- Applicants must be a New Zealand citizen or permanent resident.
- The Scholarship is primarily targeted at those currently working in dispute resolution or studying in related undergraduate/postgraduate courses.
- The ideal candidate will demonstrate a commitment to dispute resolution. This may include membership of an accredited industry training organisation such as AMINZ, Resolution Institute, the New Zealand Law Society or a similar organisation.

The Scholarship

The Scholarship is a cash contribution of up to \$10,000 towards continuing professional development in the area of dispute resolution either in New Zealand or overseas. This is a contribution towards study or research costs, airfares and accommodation. The terms and conditions of the Scholarship will be confirmed with the successful candidate prior to acceptance.

The recipient will also have the option of a placement with FairWay either before or after their study or research. This may include access to mentoring or coaching if appropriate.

Key Dates

- 24 July 2019: Applications open
- 21 August 2019: Applications close
- 4 September 2019: Shortlist named
- 4 October 2019: Shortlisted papers submitted
- 14 – 18 October 2019: Interviews
- 24 October 2019: Winner announced

Panel

The selection Panel will consist of the FairWay CEO, Principal - Dispute Resolution, Anne Scragg, and others as required.

Conditions of Acceptance

Applicants should give an indication of when and how they intend to use the Scholarship, preferably within 12 months (extended periods may be considered).

Upon completion of the course of study or research, the applicant will communicate back to the profession their learnings, through a seminar or lecture. This will be discussed and arranged with the applicant.

Selection Criteria

All applicants will submit an abstract for a 1500 word paper on a dispute resolution topic. It is expected that no more than 5 applicants will be shortlisted.

All applicants will be required to submit at least one written reference with their application.

Up to five applicants will be requested to write a full paper (1500 words) which they will give permission to be published on our website. These applicants will then proceed be interviewed and a winner selected.
